## News

In a recent Case Study, PAS was contacted by Prisoner A, who was paralysed from the chest down and who was not receiving adequate care and consideration. Unfortunately, PAS hears very often of older prisoners, or those with disabilities, whose requirements are not being met, leaving them in potentially horrific conditions.

In this case, Prisoner A was being injured by repeated falls, and was suffering from pressure sores due to his inability to clean himself or access sanitary facilities. We immediately sent letters to both the prison and local authority reminding them of their duties of care, and requesting that they fulfil their obligations. However, instead of acting as we asked, Prisoner A was transferred to another prison where he was kept in even more horrific conditions. His new cell was even more inaccessible than the first, with no access to a toilet or sanitary facilities, leading to him having to defecate on the floor. We therefore sent a pre-action letter threatening further action and initiated a Judicial Review of the failure to provide reasonable adjustments for the prisoner. As a result, Prisoner A


was moved to a much more suitable cell, and another solicitor's firm was brought on board to initiate a claim for damages.

Children and the Law; PAS' **New Family Law Guides** 

At our Annual Lecture this year, PAS will launch four new Family Law guides that we have written and published in association with charity Rights of Woman. The four titles aimed at the two thirds of female prisoners who are mothers - deal with various aspects of the law that have baring on parenting from inside prison. The titles are:

## **Community Care Caseworker**

PAS has recently appointed a new part-time Community Care Caseworker to replace Anna Fairbank, who retired in June. Laine Ritchie will work alongside Laura Orger to liaise with and, if necessary, issue Judicial Review claims against, prison/probation services and local authorities when they fail to meet their legal obligations to vulnerable adult prisoners. They will continue to deliver legal Outreach Clinics at various prisons. Laine obtained a BA in French studies and a Graduate Diploma in Law before qualifying as a Solicitor at Russell-Cooke in 2012. Laine has previously worked as a criminal and human rights paralegal and as a valued PAS volunteer. We are delighted to welcome Laine to the charity.
